VI: COLLEGE FINANCIAL AID and INFORMATION ABOUT COLLEGES:

FASTWEB. <http://www.fastweb.com/>

Fastweb is a useful college-preparation Web site, providing information on colleges, scholarships, jobs, financial aid, and college life. The Scholarships section matches students based on institution, location, area of study, academic/athletic performance, ethnicity, religious affiliation, and activities. Results provide key information about the scholarships, including a description, amount, application deadline, and contact information. Tucked on the bottom of *Fastweb's* pages are links to excellent college, scholarship, and grant directories. Students may contact *Fastweb* staff via e-mail or postal mail with questions. Several federal Web sites--*Student Aid on the Web* <http://studentaid.ed.gov/>, *College.gov*, and *MyMoney.gov*--also provide valuable education funding information in a less commercial format. *Fastweb* is recommended for college-bound students seeking free information on funding, college life, and career development.

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[College Crunch](http://www.collegecrunch.org/) claims to be "the best college resource online ever." College Crunch features college reviews, college profiles, tips for navigating the logistics of college financing, and career planning advice. The career planning advice includes lists of salaries by career. <http://www.collegecrunch.org/>

COLLEGE NAVIGATOR This source for college information allows you to search for U.S. colleges by name, location, type of institution, and programs/majors. Provides material about expenses, financial aid, enrollment, admission, athletics, and more. Includes multiple institutions on a "favorites" list to see side-by-side comparisons. **Also includes links to material about applying for financial aid and careers.** From the Institute of Education Science (IES) National Center for Education Statistics, U.S. Department of Education. <http://nces.ed.gov/collegenavigator/>

COLLEGE MAJORS 101, by Andrew Leidner <http://www.collegemajors101.com> Leidner, who has college admissions and financial aid experience, created *College Majors 101* to educate high school and undergraduate college students about college majors and the careers to which they can lead. Each major has its own "channel" presenting descriptive information, along with typical positions held by people who have majored in a particular area. Although more robust descriptions of both careers and majors would enhance the site, and can be found elsewhere (see *Quintessential Careers* <http://quintcareers.com/>), some unique aspects of this site are of special note. The listing of undergraduate student competitions (along with winners) provides information about the strength and quality of programs that is often obscured by national rankings. Two particularly valuable sections of each channel are the lists of related student/professional associations and the list of links to relevant trade publications. Often overlooked, these key sources of information can yield insider information not to be found elsewhere. Each channel also includes a list of employers who recruit in a particular field, a list of "featured" colleges and universities offering the major, links to related news stories, and a more comprehensive listing of accredited programs. Much of the site's content is delivered through videos. This approach likely will appeal to a wide audience and should provide institutions with an opportunity to highlight actual students and their work. Users also have the opportunity to register with the site, and have their contact information forwarded to the appropriate college partners. *College Majors 101* was recently listed as a top ten college Web site by Lynn O'Shaughnessy, a blogger for *U.S. News & World Report*. It is a valuable resource for anyone researching college majors and career paths. .

Einztein isn't a standard search engine as all courses listed by Einztein are reviewed by a PhD level editorial team. Each course listed by Einztein comes with a listing of the types of materials available for each course. Some courses have audio, video, and documents while other course may only have one or two of those elements. Visitors to Einztein can search for course by keyword or simply browse courses by subject area.

Einztein allows you to “**connect** your favorite courses to relevant learning resources. **Exchange** knowledge and information with other members whose academic interests match yours. **Join** peers and professors in exploring the newest academic frontier: free online courses.”

COLLEGE MAJORS 101, by Andrew Leidner <http://www.collegemajors101.com>
Leidner, who has college admissions and financial aid experience, created *College Majors 101* to educate high school and undergraduate college students about college majors and the careers to which they can lead. Each major has its own "channel" presenting descriptive information, along with typical positions held by people who have majored in a particular area. Although more robust descriptions of both careers and majors would enhance the site, and can be found elsewhere (see *Quintessential Careers* <http://quintcareers.com/>), some unique aspects of this site are of special note. The listing of undergraduate student competitions (along with winners) provides information about the strength and quality of programs that is often obscured by national rankings. Two particularly valuable sections of each channel are the lists of related student/professional associations and the list of links to relevant trade publications. Often overlooked, these key sources of information can yield insider information not to be found elsewhere. Each channel also includes a list of employers who recruit in a particular field, a list of "featured" colleges and universities offering the major, links to related news stories, and a more comprehensive listing of accredited programs. Much of the site's content is delivered through videos. This approach likely will appeal to a wide audience and should provide institutions with an opportunity to highlight actual students and their work. Users also have the opportunity to register with the site, and have their contact information forwarded to the appropriate college partners. *College Majors 101* was recently listed as a top ten college Web site by Lynn O'Shaughnessy, a blogger for *U.S. News & World Report*. It is a valuable resource for anyone researching college majors and career paths.
